Historical Significance

(Saint) Teneu's son was named (Saint) Mungo or Kentigern. He died in 612.



Culross was a center for coal mining in the 16th and 17th centuries. In 1575, Sir George Bruce of Carnock established Culross and dug the world's first coal mine to extend under the sea. He designed a method to drain the constant leakage in the tunnels and provide a safe environment for the workers.

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Unfortunately, the mine was destroyed by a storm in 1625. Sir George's family monument stands in the north transept of the Abby church. He also built the "Palace" of Culross and its beautiful gardens.



Culross' secondary industry was salt panning. The processed salt was shipped from here to the Netherlands and then by land to other parts of Europe. Notice the red roof tiles around town? Sailors loaded these tiles on the returning and empty "salt" ships and used them as ballasts.

By the 18th century, the town had declined to nothing more than a "ghost town." The harbor was filled in, and the coastal railway cut off the sea.

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Today, Culross has well-preserved buildings, making it one of Scotland's most historically significant villages. It is often used as a filming location for period dramas, including the popular TV series Outlander.

Top Attractions

Culross Palace

This 16th-century merchant's house is the crown jewel of Culross. The Palace, painted in a distinctive yellow, features beautifully restored interiors with period furnishings. The adjacent gardens are a delightful mix of herbs, vegetables, and flowers, maintained as they would have been in the 17th century.

Culross Abbey

Founded in 1217, Culross Abbey is a partially ruined former Cistercian monastery. The Abbey church is still in use and offers a peaceful atmosphere for reflection. The ruins and the well-maintained graveyard provide a fascinating insight into medieval monastic life.

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Townhouse and Mercat Cross

The Townhouse, built in 1626, served as the administrative center of Culross. It now houses a small museum and exhibition space. The nearby Mercat Cross is a traditional Scottish market cross, symbolizing the village's historical right to hold markets.

The Study
