What to Do: Snap a photo with the “El Oso y El Madroño” statue (the Bear and the Strawberry Tree), a symbol of Madrid.

Location: Central Madrid

### **Prado Museum (Museo del Prado)**

Description: One of the world's most renowned art museums, with works by masters like Velázquez, Goya, and El Greco.

What to Do: Explore the extensive collection of Spanish, Italian, and Flemish art, and don't miss “Las Meninas” by Velázquez.

Location: Paseo del Prado, s/n, 28014

## **Retiro Park (Parque del Retiro)**

Description: A green oasis in the middle of Madrid, perfect for a leisurely stroll or a boat ride on its large artificial lake.

What to Do: Visit the Crystal Palace, and don't miss the various sculptures and fountains scattered throughout the park.

Location: Plaza de la Independencia, 7, 28001

## **Reina Sofia Museum (Museo Nacional Centro de Arte Reina Sofía)**

Description: Madrid's modern art museum, home to works by Salvador Dalí, Joan Miró, and Picasso, including his famous anti-war painting "Guernica."

What to Do: Dive into Spain's modern art scene, and take a closer look at the political messages behind many works.

Location: Calle de Santa Isabel, 52, 28012

## **Gran Vía**

Description: Known as the "Spanish Broadway," Gran Vía is the city's main thoroughfare, lined with grand architecture, shops, theaters, and restaurants.

What to Do: Shop, watch a musical, or just admire the buildings, like the Metropolis Building and Edificio Telefónica.

Location: From Calle de Alcalá to Plaza de España

## **Flamenco Shows**
